About the Foundation

The Greater Northwest Kansas Community Foundation (GNWKCF) was formed to increase exposure and opportunities for philanthropy throughout northwest Kansas and the tri-state region. In 2009, realizing the benefits to regionalization, the Bird City Century II Development Foundation created and affiliated with GNWKCF. The hope was that other communities in the region would too become a part of GNWKCF, so that together we can build strong communities by building a strong regional community foundation to support its communities.

The Greater Northwest Kansas Community Foundation is an organization exempt from Federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, a public charity under section 509(a)(3), a supporting organization, and a non-profit corporation organized in the State of Kansas. With this designation, the Foundation is a supporting organization of the Greater Kansas City Community Foundation. The board of directors took these steps to ensure the future of the Foundation as a community foundation. With this relationship, Greater Kansas City Community Foundation assists the Foundation with back office and legal support.

Services to Affiliate Foundations

GNWKCF offers two types of affiliate relationships to other community foundations, an Affiliate and a Partner.

An Affiliate Community Foundation is a collection of community funds to increase the philanthropic base for a geographic area. Both endowed and non-endowed funds are developed to provide financial support to 501(c)(3) and other qualifying charitable non-profit organizations and for charitable purposes to benefit area residents.

A Partner Community Foundation is an Agency Fund of GNWKCF. The Partner Community Foundation relationship is for Community Foundations who already have a 501(c)(3) and already have employees, and an operating endowment to sustain its operations.

Kansas Wildlife Federation Receives Memorials

During 2014, the Kansas Wildlife Federation was the recipient of five memorials. Donations in memory of Ralph Cramm of Wichita, Andrew Hawks of El Dorado, Henry Karl, Jr. of Winchester, Gary Rambo of Mulvane and Scott Shook of Hutchinson totaling \$7,490 were received.

The Federation is working with the families to conduct activities in memory of their loved ones. Family fishing days, shotgun shooting events and other events will be held for the public. One family has decided to sponsor scholarships for 10-12 year-old kids to attend KWF's Outdoor Adventure Camp in June.

At its 2015 Annual Meeting in Hays February 21, KWF honored 7 Kansans for their work in various fields of conservation during 2014 through its Conservation Achievement Program (CAP). Those honored included: Joe Kramer of Pratt, Conservationist of the Year; Michael Pearce of Newton , Conservation Communicator; Theresa Berger of Sylvan Grove, Outdoor Skills Instructor; Jim Mason of Wichita , Conservation Educator; David Royer of Holton, Forest Conservationist; Stacy Hoeme of Scott City , Farmer/Rancher Wildlife Conservationist; and Harper County Youth/David Berry Memorial Hunt of Anthony, Conservation Organization.

Several organizations sponsored the trophies awarded to the winners: the Flint Hills Chapter of the Quail and Upland Wildlife Federation sponsored the Conservation Communicator trophy; Geary County Fish and Game Association of Junction City sponsored the Outdoor Skills Instructor trophy; Westar, Inc. of Topeka sponsored the Conservation Educator trophy; the Kansas State Chapters of the National Wild Turkey Federation sponsored the Forest Conservationist trophy; and the Kansas Farmers Union of McPherson sponsored the Farmer/Rancher Wildlife Conservationist trophy. Lillian G. Lawson Memorial Fund



Lillian G. Lawson taught third grade in the Atwood Grade School for 28 years and "loved every minute of it" and she "never had a bad student or a bad parent."

When she passed away in September 2014, at the age of 96, her family contacted The Greater Northwest Kansas Community Foundation for help to establish the *Lillian G. Lawson Memorial Fund* as a lasting legacy. The fund, along with continuing contributions, will be used to enhance educational experiences for students at Rawlins County/Atwood Grade School.

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Bird City Century II Development Foundation

In 1985, Bird City Century II Development Foundation, Inc. was established; organized for the betterment and benefit of the Bird City community. In 2009, Bird City Century II became an affiliate of GNWKCF, and continues to serve Bird City through local grantmaking, scholarships and community development projects.

The legacies left by the Robertson's and Rosemary Griffin with their multimillion dollar bequests have made the 'impossible' possible in our community!

Funds of Bird City Century II Development Foundation

The <u>Bird City Century II Community Initiative Fund</u> is an unrestricted endowment fund from which the Foundation Board of Directors makes its general and strategic grants each year.

The <u>Bird City Century II Business Incubator Program Fund</u> makes low-interest loans to small businesses in Bird City, either start-up or expansion, through a revolving loan fund.

The <u>Bird City Century II Scholarship Fund</u> houses the <u>Edgar and Mabel Robertson Scholarship</u> for Cheylin High School seniors, and the <u>Business Development Scholarship</u> offered to individuals wishing to expand their education, and live and work in Bird City upon completion of their degree or certification.

The <u>Bird City E-Community Fund</u> was established to support youth and adult education and business development efforts in Bird City with entrepreneurial focus.

The <u>Bird City 150th Celebration Fund</u> was setup to support the public and charitable entities in Bird City to host a 150th birthday celebration in 2035.

The <u>Bird City Rural High School / Bird City Historic Preservation Fund</u> was established with the goal of rescuing and relocating the pictorial and artifact history of Bird City Rural High School (BCRHS), along with preserving and protecting the history and origins of Bird City.

The <u>Cheylin Schools Foundation Fund</u> was created to support projects within, and assist Cheylin Schools as State funding cuts continue to affect schools across Kansas.

The <u>Thresher Association Endowment Fund</u> was formed to benefit and sustain the future of the annual Tri-State Antique Engine and Thresher Show.

The <u>Robert Brubaker Family Fund</u> is a donor-advised Fund. Robert Brubaker, one of the original founders of the Foundation, retired from the Board of Directors in 2009. The Fund was setup to honor Robert for his years of service and commitment to the community. The Fund allows Robert to support charitable organizations and projects that he cares about most.

The <u>GNWKS Real Estate Fund</u>, <u>LLC</u> was formed to house the real estate properties owned by Bird City Century II Development Foundation, including costs to maintain and/or renovate these properties for business development.



Through successful fundraising efforts throughout the past couple of years, the Max Jones Field House renovations were pretty much completed in 2014, just in time for the 50th Anniversary celebration of the Field House (originally built in 1965).

In 2013, The Black & Gold Booster Club Fund granted \$213,529 to Goodland Schools for the north section of the bleacher project. In 2014, they granted \$171,719 for the installation of the south section of bleachers.

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Bird City Century II Development Foundation

Bird City Match Day

Bird City Century II Development Foundation held their second Bird City Match Day event on December 2nd, raising awareness and support for our local non-profits in the Cheylin community.



Bird City Century II committed to match \$15,000 in contributions to the eligible organizations. The Foundation extended their office hours from 7:00 am -7:00 pm to accept donations throughout the day. Donations came in the form of cash, checks and grain.

The organizations that were eligible to have contributions matched included: Bird City Community Club, Bird City Historical Association, Bird City Area on Aging, Tri-State Antique Engine and Threshers Association, Bird City Food Bank, Bird City Ministerial Alliance, Bird City Girl Scouts, Bird City Go-Getters 4H Club, Community Youth Group, Awanas, St. Joseph Catholic Youth Organization, St. Joseph Catholic Youth Organization, United Methodist Youth Council, Bird City Library, Bird City Swimming Pool, Bird City EMS, Bird City Fire Department, Cheylin Recreation Commission, Bird City Housing Authority, Thresher Association Endowment Fund, Cheylin Wellness Center and Cheylin Preschool Program.

Tax deductible donations elsewhere were available to be made if the donor chose to; however, the Foundation did not match contributions outside of the organizations listed above.

The total contributed from the community on Bird City Match Day was \$22,773.44. Adding the \$150 in door prize drawings, where winners received an additional \$25 to give to the organization of their choice in their name, and the \$15,000 match from the Foundation, the grand total amount going back to the organizations is \$37,923.44. That is almost \$13,000 more than last year's event!

Kathleen Ann Bergin was born on Sept. 9, 1958 in Great Bend, KS. She was the fourth child of Ed and JoAnn, she had nine brothers and sisters. Her family relocated to Holyrood, KS when she was two. In high school she played on the first ever girls basketball and volleyball teams. She attended Marymount College in Salina on a basketball scholarship. She graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Biology. Kathy had always wanted to be a teacher, and she definitely chose the right profession. Her first teaching position was at Cuba-Hillcrest, Cuba, KS. Then in 1982

she moved to Hoxie, KS. Kathy started off teaching biology and physical science to freshmen and sophomores. After teaching cutbacks took place, she was left teaching all the sciences: Physics, Chemistry, Biology and Physical Science. Kathy loved teaching, but her true passion was coaching.

In her time at Hoxie High, she was the head volleyball coach from 1983-2000, the head basketball coach in 1984 and was the assistant basketball coach under Shelly Hoyt from 2002-2009. She also coached at the junior high level. She was a very fair and consistent coach. Kathy became the Athletic Director in 1996 and held that position until 2009. Kathy married Kevin Schiltz on June 16, 2007. She was diagnosed with cancer on Sept. 8, 2009, one day before her 51st birthday. She passed away on June 29, 2010 in her home with her family and friends. She was such a great person: funny, witty, smart, happy, talented, caring and loving.

The Kathy Bergin-Schiltz Memorial Fund was established to honor Kathy; supporting programs and causes that would have been important to her.

Scholarships will be awarded to Hoxie USD 412 and Golden Plains USD 316 graduating seniors who reside in Sheridan County that have been involved with youth activities in the Sheridan County community in a volunteer capacity.
